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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In April 2008 Nepal held its first elections since the signing of the Comprehensive Peace Agreement in 2006 to elect a constituent assembly mandated to draft a new constitution. 2008 elections were organized by the Election Commission of Nepal with significant assistance and technical support from the Electoral Assistance Office of the United Nations Mission in Nepal. Following these elections, UNDP initiated the three-year Electoral Support Project (ESP) that aimed at institutional strengthening and professional development of the Election Commission of Nepal. As the need increased to expand the role of ESP to providing technical advice and operational support for the upcoming cycle of elections, the project was revised and extended till 2016 to meet the current needs of the Election Commission of Nepal. This revision constitutes Phase II of the Electoral Support Project, signed in 2012.

The Electoral Support Project Phase II responds to the need for continued capacity building of the Election Commission of Nepal for it to build long term institutional and human resources capacity in order to organize credible elections in the context of a highly polarized political environment and a period of political instability. Under three outputs the project aims to 1) strengthen the capacity of the Election Commission of Nepal to function as a permanent, independent, credible and professional institution of governance 2) support activities throughout the electoral cycle to ensure key processes are conducted in an effective, sustainable and credible manner; and 3) increase democratic participation in the forthcoming cycle of elections and ensure an inclusive electoral process including under-represented groups and vulnerable and traditionally marginalized communities

Through signing of the project document in November 2012, UNDP formalized its extended partnership with the Election Commission of Nepal for the project period of 2012-2016 with a total budget of USD 24.6 million. The European Union is a new partner and significant contributor to ESP Phase II with financial assistance of EUR 8, 400,000 (USD 10,840,000 million), the partnership was formalized through signing of a contribution agreement between EU and UNDP in December, 2012. Similarly, an agreement was signed between DFID and UNDP on 7 December 2012 of UK Pound 4 million (USD 6,460,000 million). UNDP contributed USD 900,000 to initiate planned activities in 2012, even before signing of the agreements with DFID and EU. Norway and Denmark have expressed commitment to bridge the funding gap for Phase II towards early 2013.

Some of the project's key achievements of 2012 include:

Support to ECN in the registration of an additional 10.9 million citizens (51.22% female) through ECN's ongoing voter registration program. In order to register missed voters and ensure the voter list captured correct information of registered voters, ESP also supported ECN in making the lists available to the public in 75 districts, municipalities and VDCs for filling of claims and objections and organized re-verification to capture the correct information of voters. As of September 2012, the re-verification process was completed in 62 districts and the updated data returned to ECN. The data from these districts included in excess of 8 million voter records, all of which have been re-integrated onto the central database system at ECN. The analysis of re-verified data from the 62 districts indicates that known data integrity issues such as ward and polling location mismatch and gender/name mismatch have almost entirely been addressed.













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- The strengthened professional capacity of ECN officials and electoral stakeholders including civil society organizations and political parties: Through the BRIDGE trainings on Voter Information and Electoral Management, Gender and Elections among others, a total of 351 persons were trained. These trainings were conducted in joint collaboration with the ECN International Foundation for Electoral System (IFES), International Institute for Democracy and Electoral Assistance (IDEA) and UNDP Global Programme for Electoral Cycle Support (GPECS).
- Multi-functional Electoral Education and Information Center (EEIC) was constructed and officially inaugurated on 24 May 2012 by the Right Honorable President Dr. Ram Baran Yadav. The Centre, established within the premises of ECN, is providing voter education and public outreach to students, teachers, civil society organizations, political parties, police and representatives from different government ministries. Till date, 6172 visitors have visited the center and taken part in its 90- minute educational program.
- Strengthened ECN capacity to store and maintain election materials through the construction of the Electoral Assets Storage Center. The Electoral Assets Storage Center is expected to house all election related materials including IT equipment used in the country's first ever biometric voter registration. During election periods the Electoral Assets Storage Center will serve as multipurpose facilities for various elections specific activities including as a media center.
- ➤ Through a stronger focus on gender mainstreaming, the project was able to raise awareness within ECN on gender issues and encourage it to take a number of positive steps towards mainstreaming gender in electoral processes as well as in the management of the ECN. Voter registration figures in 2012 show positive trends in voter registration for women (51.22% female). This increasing figure among female voters could be attributed to deliberate assignment of women officials in voters' education, door to door enumeration and voters' registration. Another major achievement of the project includes the development of ECN's first ever Gender and Social Inclusion policy, which was developed through extensive consultations with stakeholders, and currently awaiting official adaptation by the Commission.
- The establishment of a Geographic Information System (GIS) unit at the Headquarter of ECN in Kathmandu. It's a great achievement that ECN after the endorsement of its new organogram has allocated two of its staff to operationalize the GIS Unit. A total of 130 ECN officials from district offices and headquarters were trained on GIS and use of GPS in electoral cycle with emphasis on electoral mapping. Utilizing this new GIS capacity and with the aid of GPS technology, ECN has initiated the mapping of polling stations in all 75 districts with great success.

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2. NATIONAL CONTEXT: OUTCOME LEVEL PROGRESS

The Constituent Assembly (CA) elected through historic elections in April 2008, could not produce a constitution within the final deadline of May 27, 2012 and was dissolved. The government called for fresh elections of the CA to be held in November 27, 2012. However, due to lack of consensus among political parties on the decision to go for new CA elections and differences within parties on the way forward, the necessary steps to hold elections were not taken including amendment of the Interim Constitution of Nepal 2007 and the necessary electoral laws that would pave the way for the Election Commission of Nepal (ECN) to hold the scheduled elections in 2012. Political uncertainty continues with no agreement on how to resolve the existing political impasse, no clarity on type and date of elections, and no movement on amendment of the Interim Constitution. It is anticipated, however, that the next election will take place either in April/May or in November 2013.

The political vacuum has also affected the appointment process to constitutional bodies including the Election C omission of Nepal. Commissioner Mr. Dolakh Bahadur Gurung is now serving as the Chief Election Commissioner (officiating) after the end of tenure of Acting Chief Commissioner, Neel Kantha Uprety. Out of the 5 positions of Election Commissioners stipulated in the Interim Constitution, only two positions are currently filled. Furthermore, the tenure of the remaining two commissioners will also end in January 2013 with no clarity on appointment of new commissioners. The ECN will, therefore, be without Commissioners from mid-January 2013 if vacant positions are not filled by the Government.

Despite the uncertainty around elections, the ECN continued its planning and preparatory work in 2012 to conduct inclusive, participatory and credible future elections, whenever they may be called. The ESP continued to provide technical support to ECN in these preparatory activities including the registration of 10.9 million voters as of December 2012, voter and civic education to the public through the Electoral Education and Information Centre, the several strategy documents and assessments carried out per request of the Commission and continued training initiatives at all levels of the institution.

Project Overview

UNDP's assistance to the Election Commission of Nepal through the Electoral Support Project is provided in line with the UNDP's mandate to work with developing countries in the areas of professional development and democratic governance. The "electoral cycle approach" is closely reflected and applied to the overall strategy of the present Electoral Support Project. It focuses on the notion that the provision of event-driven support is no longer attractive, sustainable and effective in terms of cost-benefit and achieving enduring results, and that the impact of electoral support on broader governance and development goals must be taken into account.

Phase II of the project period (2012 -2016) focuses on long-term electoral capacity building in addition to operational support for future electoral cycles. The year 2012 was considered a preparatory year for the roll out of Phase II. Some of the strategic areas of interventions of Phase II are as follows:

a. Long-term capacity building: The Electoral Support Project continues to be centered on the provision of sustained institutional strengthening and professional development assistance initiatives to assist the Election Commission of Nepal in its efforts to strengthen and enhance its own capacity to function as a permanent, professional and independent electoral management body.













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- b. Operational support for upcoming series of elections: The Electoral Support Project is also centered on providing immediate operational support particularly in view of its next major challenge, which is the preparation of the first legislative elections (likely in 2013, according to the 2011 UN NAM) and, possibly, local elections (possibly a year after the legislative elections according to the ESP and ECN Chief Electoral Commissioner) to be conducted once the new Constitution of Nepal is finalized or current Interim Constitution of Nepal amended.
- c. Democratic participation: Increasing awareness of electorates on governance and electoral processes, especially of disadvantaged and vulnerable groups (women and ethnic minorities) so they could meaningfully participate prior as well as during elections.

3. RESULTS

The progress of the project and achievements made in 2012 are presented according to the activity results set out in the 2012 Annual Work Plan:

PROJECT OUTPUT 1: STRENGTHENED CAPACITY OF THE ECN TO FUNCTION AS A PERMANENT,

INDEPENDENT, CREDIBLE AND PROFESSIONAL INSTITUION OF

GOVERNANCE

Activity Result 1.1: Support with Strategic Planning

Formulated with the assistance of ESP and with the aim of building ECN capacity to strengthen itself as an independent institution able to deliver profession and credible elections, the five year strategic plan (2009-2013) has been gradually implemented by ECN. The ESP continued to support ECN in implementing the targets set out in ECN strategic plan in the areas of Voter Registration, Geographic Information System, Voter Awareness, Human Resource Development, Information technology Advancement etc.

Annual Review Workshop

The Project provided technical assistance and logistical support to ECN in conducting a national level annual review workshop that brought together 122 officials including District Election Officers from all 75 districts. The objective of the workshop was for ECN to review its progress for the year and receive inputs from its field offices for its future planning including updating of its strategic plan. During the workshop, participants feedback indicated a more participatory and inclusive gathering with each district being provided adequate space to share achievements, learning for the year and priorities for next year. As an output of the workshop, the '19-point Godavari Declaration' was produced (Annex 1) and is shaping ECN's decision-making on many levels. One of the major points discussed and decided in the workshop was the review of ECN's current Strategic Plan (2009- 2013); participants provided recommendations on how to proceed with the review and updating of the plan. Emphasis was also placed on including gender and social inclusion in the new strategic plan so that it is mainstreamed at both the institutional and programmatic level. Following and as a result of its continued support in this area, ESP has developed a concept note for full review and update of the strategic plan that will take place in 2013.













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Assessments\ Studies

The Project also provided continued technical advice in major intervention areas with several studies and assessments conducted to enable ECN to make more informed decisions.

Assessment\ studies completed and reports to be finalized

1. ECN's procurement capacity assessment

As a follow-up of the recommendation made by DFID review mission of Phase I of ESP, the Project recruited a national consultant to review the existing procurement capacity of ECN and provide recommendations to ensure enduring and sustainable capacity enhancement of the Commission. The Consultant reviewed the previous procurement proceedings and consulted the concerned ECN officials to discuss the major issues on procurement management and to identify the capacity development needs. Some of the key findings are as follows:

- Lack of coordination between Procurement Unit and Account Sections,
- Staff found it difficult to understand and apply procurement procedures. Some of
 examples are: master procurement plan was prepared but not following Public
 Procurement Monitoring Office (PPMO) prescribed format, Guidelines as prescribed by
 Public Procurement Act (PPA) and Public Procurement Regulations (PPR) on advertising
 not adequately followed ,quality of bid evaluation not satisfactory etc
- Limited knowledge and skills on planning and budgeting, donor fund operation, store management, procurement management and computer skills

Some of the key recommendations are as follows:

- Regular procurement training should be provided to the ECN staff, including District Election Officers and Accountants,
- Coordination with Public Procurement Monitoring Office (PPMO) should be strengthened for the capacity development of procurement unit and e-procurement,
- Separate Financial Management training should be provided at centre as well as district level
- Post training evaluation and monitoring system of training program is essential to make training and development program more effective; both systems need to be established under ECN.
- A training schedule has been prepared and submitted to ECN for imparting immediate procurement management training in December 2012.
- Electronic Voting Machine (EVM) Study on Feasibility and Best Practices
 In order to support the Election Commission of Nepal to make informed decision on use of Electoral Voting Machines, UNDP ESP in consultation with ECN organized a feasibility assessment mission on use of EVM.

Global Networking and South- South Cooperation

UNDP ESP continued supporting ECN to strengthen its networks with its counterparts in the region and beyond. The Project supported the Commission not only in building new and strengthening existing relationships through exchanges but it also supported the exchange of knowledge from Nepal to other countries and vice -versa. In 2012, a total of 20 ECN officials, including a few ESP thematic leaders visited 8 countries. Some of the learning visits are as follows:

- ECN officials participated in EC UNDP thematic workshop on Information Technology and Election Management in Kenya
- Exchange visit to Australian Education Center in Australia















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- The visit of former chief commissioner and other ECN officials in Third conference of Heads of Election Management Bodies of SAARC member States in India
- Former chief election commissioner's visit to 5th Annual International Electoral Affairs Symposium in Mauritius
- The visit of ECN joint secretary to attend an observation of US Election in Washington DC, USA
- ECN and ESP staffs participated in Training on Alige Software Project Management in Pune, India
- The visit of ECN joint secretary to participate in Training in Leadership Conflict Management and Mediation skills for Electoral stakeholders held in Barcelona, Spain
- Commissioner' participated in 'Declaration on free and fair Elections' held in Thailand
- ESP staff participated in Elections and Security Training in Thailand

These learning visits provided participants opportunities to understand how the electoral system and processes work in other countries. It has contributed to ECN in making policy decisions, technical implementation of activities, sharing best practices and learning and strengthening networking with regional and global election management bodies.

The on-going partnership between the ECN and the Australian Election Commission (AEC) was further strengthened by signing of the Memorandum of Understanding between two Commissions after the inauguration of EEIC in May 2012 for Public Sector Linkages Program. Two technical experts from AEC also provided expert services to the ECN prior to the opening of EEIC. Similarly, the Australian Youth Ambassador for Development is working for EEIC providing IT support since January 2012 for a year.

Activity 1.2: Support with Long-Term Professional Development and Staff Retention

Professional Development Trainings

In order to develop sustainable and enduring institutional and professional capacities within ECN, the project continued organizing trainings and workshops on customized BRIDGE modules for ECN officials and electoral stakeholders. A total of 351 participants were trained (275 male and 76 women) through 16 trainings\ workshops, including a 10-day 'Train the Facilitators' course.

The participants were mainly the ECN officials, other government officials, representatives from political parties, civil society and media. In 2012, one national facilitator was fully accredited and 21 semi-accredited out of which 8 were female.

The topics and contents of the trainings\ workshops were developed in consultation with ECN officials to identify areas where the Commission recognized needs to strengthen the capacity of its staff members for individual professional growth as well as for institutional strengthening. All the training materials were translated into Nepali for wider dissemination.

ECN' officials and electoral stakeholders have expressed that BRIDGE trainings have helped them in enriching their knowledge on

democracy and elections as well as developed confidence in planning and facilitating electoral administration. In addition, they have also shared that it has contributed in keeping ECN engaged













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with its electoral stakeholders during inter- election periods, broadening the parameter for understanding local needs and issues so it could be incorporated in designing electoral programs, laws and policies that would ultimately improve the quality of election management and administration.

Apart from BRIGDE trainings, as part of the professional development initiatives, UNDP ESP also provided assistance to the ECN to enhance the professional knowledge of ECN officials through other professional trainings, such as on Communication and Media, ICT, procurement. A total of 32 participants benefited from these trainings.

Impact and sustainability assessment of BRIDGE training

The BRIDGE program has been implemented for more than 4 years and continues to enjoy strong support from within ECN and its stakeholders. The continuation of the program needs to be grounded in a solid understanding of the impact of BRIDGE to date and sustainability of the program by its beneficiary, the ECN. Therefore, the impact assessment of BRIDGE trainings was carried out in 2012 to aassess the performance and impact of BRIDGE against its intended objectives and provides recommendations on strengthening national ownership and sustainability of the programme. The recommendations made by the assessment team will be implemented jointly by ECN and ESP. The gist of the recommendations is as follows:

A need for developing national accredited facilitators for the sustainability and localization
of the BRIDGE program in Nepal. Training of Facilitators (TtF) and modular trainings to the
government staff and high school teachers should be organized at central, district and local
level to nationalize the programme and build capacity on electoral system and processes
nationwide











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- Facilitator mobilization strategy should be developed by ECN to ensure facilitators selected
 are those who have received TtF, rather than mobilizing external facilitators. Also, the
 facilitators selected for TtF should be the ECN staff of all levels and change in mind-set is
 required within ECN to accept that a section officer could be a facilitator and secretary a
 trainee.
- Female participants comprised of 19 % of total participants from 2008- 2012. Creative strategies to be taken to enhance the representation of female as participants as well as facilitators.
- During the election, gender responsive reporting is needed and for this media person should be trained adequately. Similarly, for the dispute resolution and voters education, the sufficient training should be conducted for civil society organisations.
- Adoption of BRIDGE training program by ECN as government training program on electoral management
- Incorporating BRIDGE modules into school\educational curriculum
- Implementation of BRIDGE training program in collaboration with civil society and other institutions, such as Staff College
- EEIC should be used as BRIDGE training centre and government should allocate funding for its sustainability
- Monitoring and evaluation system to be established to monitor the impact of BRIDGE trainings

Capacity Needs Assessment of ECN

The project recruited at the latter half of 2012 a national training capacity building expert to support ESP in serving as ESP's support to ECN in assessment of training needs of ECN and in developing capacity building strategy. The capacity building strategy is developed and awaits for the final approval of ECN.

Activity 1.3: Support with Geographic Information System (GIS) and Electoral Mapping System

In 2012, the in-house GIS unit was established at the ECN's secretariat and is fully functional with

two staff appointed by ECN. The in-house GIS facilities aims at developing digital mapping of the country including all administrative and electoral boundaries with population and voting statistics. The development of GIS is useful in planning and management of electoral processes and monitoring and observation of elections. In 2012, ESP provided strategic and active support to ECN's high level GIS program implementation the committee GIS on implementation in additional to capacity building initiatives. Professional trainings and workshops on GIS were provided to the ECN

officials at Headquarter and district offices. These capacity enhancement programs were useful in educating ECN officials on the importance and use of GIS in electoral cycle with emphasis on electoral mapping. A total of 150 ECN officials, District Electoral Officers (DEOs) and headquarter staff, participated in these trainings. Four regional trainings were also held covering all 75 DEOs on the use of GPS/GIS for polling location mapping.













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As a result of these efforts, ECN initiated polling locations mapping using GPS across the country and seeks to establish GIS in all 75 district election offices. Operational support given to ECN in the data acquisition of nearly 10,000 polling location spread across the country. Guidance has been provided on development of GPS user manual for DEOs. Thematic maps on CA Election results, invalid voting, Constituency distribution mapping, gender, voter registration and Preliminary census and citizen mapping were also produced through ECN's new in-house GIS facility.

UNDP ESP also supported Election Commission of Nepal (ECN) in conducting 'Review and Planning Workshop on Geographical Information System (GIS)' in Godavari. The two days (16-17 December, 2012) residential workshop reviewed the overall progress made on collecting data on Polling Centre Master List (PCML) using GPS/GIS tools and outlined priority areas for 2013. The ECN has identified around 10,000 polling centers for future elections in Nepal. The workshop also discussed the use of GIS tools in various stages of electoral cycle. A brief demonstration on Google Earth-based PCML data of four districts were presented in the workshop.

Activity 1.4: Support with Creation and Display of New Voter Register

UNDP ESP continued to provide technical assistance to ECN's in implementation of the nationwide

biometric voter registration (VR) program. This support consists of technical advice at the national and regional level for the field operations of the continuous voter registration process, central datacentre management, enhancement of voter registration process, troubleshooting and targeted trainings aimed at enhancing ECN capacity to sustain the achievements of the new biometric voter registration process.

Registration Progress\ Quality Assessment of Voter List

As of December 2012, 10.9 million eligible citizens have been registered. This represents approximately 65.67 percentage of all estimated in-country citizens of age of 16 years and above. Registration targets are based on the Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) preliminary 2011 census results including a total population of 26,620,809 and an absent population of 1,917,903.

The initial voter list was published in May 2012 and displayed nationwide in wards, VDCs and District Election Offices for 'claims and objection.' It allowed citizens to review their information and submit request for amendments if the information needed ratification. It was identified through this













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process, and also from independent monitoring of UNDP ESP, that there were some errors in relation to ward allocation, ward and polling location mismatch, and some specific data quality issues. As a result of these findings a data re-verification process was instigated with the objective of district offices correcting these data issues through a process of reconfirmation with citizens' enumeration forms. Simultaneously, with 'Claims and objections,' mobile camps were also organized to register missed voters. As of September 2012 the re-verification process was completed in 62 districts and the updated data returned to ECN. The data from these districts included in excess of 8 million voter records, all of which have been re-integrated onto the central database system at ECN. The analysis of re-verified data from the 62 districts indicates that known data integrity issues such as ward and polling location mismatch and gender/name mismatch have almost entirely been addressed.

In order to further ensure the quality of the voter list, ESP is supporting the ECN in conducting voter list assessment. With technical assistance of international and national consultants, detailed Terms of Reference (TOR) was developed to recruit consultancy firm to conduct national wide survey to assess the quality of voter list produced by ECN. The procurement process is on-going and the survey will start from beginning of 2013.

Database Centre

With technical assistance of UNDP ESP, the central database centre was in operation with installation and setup of equipment. In house training on datacentre installation and setup were conducted for ECN IT Officials. Two ECN and two ESP IT staffs have participated on IT training on "Agile Project Management" held in Pune, India from 5-6 December. For the purpose of data security, disaster recovery and back up, UNDP ESP provided technical assistance to ECN in developing a concept document to establish a data back-up centre at Ministry of Home Affairs (MoHA). The necessary equipment required for data recovery was procured in 2012.

Continuous Voter Registration

During Phase 1, ESP identified the need for new robust software to meet the changing needs of ECN's continuous voter registration. In 2012, the project initiated the development of requirements for the new continuous voter registration process and the specifications to be used for the procurement of services of an international firm to develop the software. Discussions with ECN in this regard were extensive and necessary to ensure that the final specifications were in line with the ECN legal and technical requirements; discussions were held at various levels including with the Commissioners who took policy decisions on the new software and formed a Software Development Committee to develop and finalize the specifications. The project is planning, in 2013, to advertise for the procurement of services of the international firm and has budgeted USD1.5M based on preliminary budget estimates prepared by experts. The final budget will be based on the proposals received and can go beyond this amount. There may also be the need for new hardware to cope with the new software.

The new software will contain features such as biometric de-duplication, migration of voters, transfer of voters, on line data transfer, provision of sharing data with other stakeholder as per requirement (NID); enhance the security feature such as user login, audit trial and activity log etc. The software development process itself is based on agile method and includes the training for the ECN Staff.

UNDP ESP through United Nations Procurement Support Office (UNPSO) Copenhagen, initiated the procurement process including development of Request for Quotations (RFQ), bid documents and software requirements. UNPSO Copenhagen conducted a pre-biding to short list technically qualified











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companies. In 2013, the project will proceed with full procurement process to recruit an international firm to develop the software against the finalized and ECN approved Software Requirement Specifications (SRS).

Electoral Assets Storage

The construction of Electoral Assets Storage at ECN premises (with area of 692sq. meter) was completed in 2012. The Electoral Assets Storage is expected to house all election related materials including IT equipment used in the country's first ever biometric voter registration. During election periods the Electoral Assets Storage will serve as multipurpose facilities for various elections specific activities including as a media center.

PROJECT OUTPUT 2: ELECTION CYCLE CONDUCTED IN AN EFFECTIVE, SUSTAINABLE AND CREDIBLE MANNER

Activity 2. 2: Support with Election Operations and Logistics

UNDP ESP supported ECN in preparing operation plan for the upcoming election. A national and international consultants recruited worked closely with ECN officials in coming up with draft operational plan, which is yet to be finalized by ECN.

Activity 2.3: Support with Electoral Dispute Resolution

UNDP ESP supported the ECN to review and assess Nepal's legal framework for electoral dispute resolution. International and national experts recruited by UNDP ESP examined and assessed the provisions related to electoral dispute resolution incorporated in Nepal's prospective electoral legal frameworks, in light of international standards and best practices related to elections and justice. The draft report prepared through the assessment focuses specifically on areas for improvement in the legal frameworks for electoral dispute resolution, with an aim that identified weaknesses will be considered by the relevant authorities and remedied in any legal framework will be adopted for upcoming elections.

Key findings of the Assessment of 2012 draft electoral dispute resolution framework:

- Overly Complex and Incoherent Electoral Dispute Resolution Framework
- Lack of Right to Judicial Recourse
- Underdeveloped and Inconsistent Campaign Complaint Process
- Inadequate Deadlines for Filing and Adjudication of Complaints and Appeals
- Insufficient Guarantees of Due Process and Transparency in Complaints Process
- Unduly Broad Penalties for Electoral Violations and Gaps in Electoral Offences
- Lack of Standing to Lodge Complaints and Appeals
- Unnecessary Obstacles to Filing Complaints

Key policy recommendations are as follows:

- Establish Complaint-related Administrative Mechanisms
- Ensure Sufficient Human and Material Resources
- Implement Training on Electoral Dispute Resolution
- Establish Cooperation with Other Responsible Bodies
- Establish Transparency Mechanisms in Complaints Process
- Implement Voter Education Initiative on Electoral Dispute Resolution Framework
- Undertake Post-election Review, Audit, and Report on Complaints Process











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UNDP ESP will work closely with the ECN in implementing the recommendations made in the assessment.

Activity 2.4: Support with Electoral Security

The ECN and UNDP initiated the electoral violence and mitigation assessment over three weeks from mid-September 2012. An assessment team lead by former Chief Election Commissioner, Mr. Bhoj Raj Pokharel, reviewed potential violence triggers and suggested mitigation measures for the first legislative elections following the Constituent Assembly (CA) elections of April 2008. A comprehensive set of recommendations were shared for consideration by ECN including the following:

- ECN to pro-actively engage with political parties in all-party meetings to re-establish the rules of the game, and engage in discourse
- To seek a higher standard of integration between the ECN and security agencies
- To strictly enforce criminal and electoral law from day one, in a pro-active and public manner
- To protect the independence and capacity of the ECN, first by ensuring the non-partisan and merit-based appointment of election commissioners, Returning Officers and Presiding Officers, and to ensure the timely and adequate delivery of election resources to the ECN.
- To meaningfully increase the role of women in politics
- To improve impartiality, coverage and coordination of observers (especially long term observers), the media, CSOs and the international community
- To urgently facilitate a national anti-violence campaign strategy

The ESP will provide continued technical assistance to support ECN in preparing an action plan for implementation of the recommendations. Some of the recommendations are supported through ESP's 2013 annual workplan.

PROJECT OUTPUT 3: INCREASED DEMOCRATIC PARTICIPATION IN THE NEXT CYCLE OF ELELCTIONS,
PARTICULALRY FOR UNDER-REPRESENTAED AND DISADVANTAGED
SEGMENTS OF THE NEPALI SOCIETY

Activity 3.1: Public Outreach, Civic and Voter Education

In order to sensitize public and raise awareness about their electoral rights, electoral system and processes, information materials and products have been produced. EEIC documentary on 'Nepal's Electoral History' is produced that will be used by ECN for public outreach and voter education nationwide. A documentary on voter registration is finalized and waits for the final endorsement by ECN.

In order to strengthen institutional capacity of ECN's public outreach, civil and voter education section, international and national advisors recruited by UNDP ESP worked closely with ECN to review its current strategy, plans, information materials and methodologies. Based on the findings of the review, UNDP ESP will continue providing technical advice and assistance to on formulating and implementing of comprehensive civic/voter education, public information, and external relations plans and strategies including budget and other required resources, timeline and delegation of responsibilities.

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Activity 3.2: Support with establishment of Electoral Education and Information Centre (EEIC)

The multi-functional Electoral Education and Information Center (EEIC) was officially inaugurated on 24 May 2012 by the Right Honorable President Dr. Ram Baran Yaday. The Centre, established within the premises of ECN, is providing voter education and public outreach to students, teachers, civil



society organizations, political parties, police and representatives from different government ministries. Till date, 6172 visitors (45% female) have visited the center and taken part in its 90minute educational program. The Center was formally handed over to the ECN by UNDP after its inauguration.

The ECN in its new organogram has allocated 10 staff to operationalize the EEIC. In order to strengthen the capacity of these staff, UNDP ESP supported ECN in organizing regular trainings on presentation skills, communication skills, leadership skills and on thematic areas of focus on ECN. Technical assistance was also provided in preparing concept papers for Public-Private-Partnership for sustainability of the Centre. With the technical assistance of UNDP ESP, EEIC has developed 'ebooking software' that will be uploaded on ECN website for visitors to make on-line bookings to visit the EEIC.

A report was produced by EEIC that contained findings of every day random evaluation undertaken by EEIC to test the quality of its services and its activities by visiting group members and their team leaders. Some of the findings are as follows:

- 76 % of respondents described their visit as excellent and shared that they had opportunities to learn more about election, democracy and governance.
- 27 % of visitors expressed that they learned about Election and Election History of Nepal from the visit; 16 % expressed they learned how to vote and importance of election; 15 % expressed that their understanding on how elections are held was enhanced by visiting EEIC
- above 90 %of the visiting groups were from private schools followed by others government schools, INGO, and NGO
- Out of all the facilities provided in the Centre, 49 % of the respondents answered that they found mock polling exercise to be most useful and 42% shared that they found interactive room and thematic presentation useful.







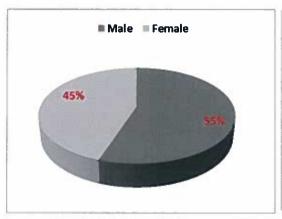






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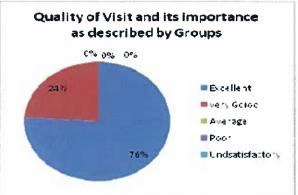


Figure 5 Disaggregated data of EEIC visitors

Some of the recommendations are as follows:

- EEIC should reach to all districts
- Civic and voter education should be provided at different level central to local
- IF EVM is used nationwide voter education should be provided accordingly
- English caption should be used in documentaries for non- Nepali speakers

Activity 3.4: Support with Gender, Social Inclusion and Vulnerable Groups

Increase in female voter registration:

Voter registration figures of 2012 shows positive trend in voter registration for women (now accounting for 51.22% among all men and women registered so far). This increasing figure among female voters could be attributed to deliberate assignment of women officials in voter education, door to door enumeration and voter registration.

Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GE/SI) was well recognized as important cross cutting issue and increase in integration of GE/SI in different activities of ECN. This is evident from the following:

- Gender and Social Inclusion agenda was given considerable space in the various regional review workshops and its outcomes were shared in the central review and planning workshop. As a result The Godavari Declaration sufficiently highlighted GESI issues related to election, need to integrate GE/SI view in all electoral process as well as need to adopt the GE/SI policy by ECN.
- BRIDGE is taken as a long term professional development initiative. More than 1000 professionals from different stakeholders (media, civil society, political party members, CA members etc) have been trained in various BRIDGE modules. Altogether 128 participants (advocates) have participated in exclusive Gender and Election training. The BRIDGE (Building Resource in Democracy, Governance and Election) training modules other than the Gender Module have also incorporated Gender and Social Inclusion elements as cross cutting issue.

Gender and Social Inclusion Policy:

Draft gender and social inclusion policy was finalized in consultation with various stakeholder groups (Civil Society and Political Parties) and commissioners approved the first draft. The policy now awaits official adaptation by the Commission.

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Consultation with women's group from sister organizations of political parties:

For the first time in the history of election commission women's wing from sister organizations of political parties were invited to share the voter registration activities of the commission and its upcoming plan and the expectations from the women's groups. The women from different political parties welcomed such initiative and used the platform to raise their concerns regarding securing voting rights of women and citizenship issues of marginalized women and groups.

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4. KEY IMPLEMENTATION ISSUES AND CHALLENGES

Retention of Election Commission of Nepal staff

ECN staff retention has remained as one of the major challenges in implementation of the project. Continuous changes in staffing affected project implementation and retention of knowledge at the institutional level. The major focus of UNDP-ESP in 2012 was on capacity enhancement through trainings, exposure visits, and on-site technical assistance. But due to frequent transfer of civil servants, ECN has not been able to utilization the knowledge and learning of staff for institutional strengthening. Neither ECN has an established mechanism in place for knowledge transfer and staff retention.

ECN Sustainability

Sustainability of ECN's activities in project supported technical areas, particularly on GIS, EEIC and VR is a challenge for the Project. The ECN should benchmark budget from the government to give continuity to these activities and also develop strategies to retain technical staff particularly on ICT.

Gender Equality and Inclusion

Lack of gender component in the ECN Strategic Plan (2009-2013) has overlooked Gender and Social Inclusion aspects and no specific targets are set for GIS. The frequent transfer of gender experts within the ECN institution impacts GESI related vision/agenda and activities. Delay in adopting the gender policy has created hindrances to formally initiating interventions based on the policy. Another challenge is the low participation of women in decision making level in ECN.

Citizenship and VR

The citizenship certificate as the only valid document for voter registration has still been a hurdle for many citizens to register themselves in Voter Registration process. Timeline for implementing voter list survey assessment and its completion on time and Integration, de-duplication and display of voter list before election announced.

ECN Procurement Capacities

ECN capacity to carryout large scale procurement remains limited, resulting in extensive assistance of ESP in the procurement of goods and services to carry out electoral activities.

Electoral Calendar

Uncertainty in the Electoral calendar is a challenge that has affected 2013 planning. As a commission moves closer to an election date, associated technical assistance parameters change. With no foreseen election date the delivery of timely technical assistance will be negatively impacted.

6. PRIORITIES FOR 2013

Activity 1.1 - Support with Strategic Planning

In 2013, ESP plans to support ECN in this area through support for the revision and update of the ECN strategic plan. This process began in 2012 with discussions both at the Commission and Secretariat level. However, due to changes in leadership and focus of ECN on voter registration and the possibility of elections taking place, the renewal of the strategic plan was pushed to 2013. The project has discussed a methodology for the updating of the strategic plan including input from district officials, all level of staff at the Secretariat, holding of external workshops with stakeholders, support of experts in the areas of budgeting and monitoring and a strong strategic planning facilitator to lead the process. ECN has agreed to address many of the recommendations made through the mid-term review of the strategic plan and further ideas and suggestions received in Godavari. Other support in this activity area includes supporting the holding of ECN's annual national level gathering bringing together officials from across the country to assess the year's progress, identify challenges and plan for the following year. In 2012 the same meeting was supported by ESP and resulted in the Godavari Declaration. This activity area also includes supporting south-south cooperation through ECN's participation in various regional forums for Election Commissions, study visits and election observation missions, and also for supporting ECN in reaching out to and sharing information with regional visitors to ECN. This activity also includes support for enhancing ECN financial management and procurement capacity; this sub-activity will take forward recommendations from the recent procurement assessment including required trainings, it also includes training and exchange knowledge with ECN on financial reporting, particularly on NPTF. Finally, following the recommendations from several assessments, ESP will also support ECN in improving its archiving and information management systems through development of databases, strategies for retaining institutional memory, induction program for new commissioners, etc.

Activity 1.2: Support with Professional Development and Cooperation

Under this activity ESP plans to provide technical assistance to follow-up and support ECN in taking forward recommendations from the capacity building strategy developed at the end of 2012, the earlier assessment on training needs and the recommendations from the 2012 review of ESP Phase I. The project recruited at the latter half of 2012 a national training capacity building expert to support ESP in serving as ESP's support to ECN in these areas. The expert, throughout 2013, will work closely with ECN to review and identify recommendations that can be implemented; those that should be incorporated into the Strategic Plan; and to provide technical assistance as needed in this area evolve over the course of the year. Through this technical assistance, the project will be working











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with ECN to internalize the recommendations outlined in the capacity building strategy as seen appropriate by ECN, and monitor the project's exit strategy. Under this activity the project will also implement several training programs including BRIDGE trainings that are conducted in collaboration with other BRIDGE partners. The division of labour between the partners on each of the BRIDGE trainings are defined and decided at BRIDGE partner meetings throughout the course of the year. General, non-BRIDGE, trainings are also envisioned based on the recent capacity building assessment and the earlier training needs assessment. Through extensive and regular consultations with ECN, the specifics of the training including topics, participants and other details will be developed on a quarterly basis.

Activity 1.3: Support with Geographic Information and Electoral Mapping

Under this activity, ESP will support ECN to complete the polling location mapping using GPS technology across the country and to establish GIS in all 75 district election offices as per its strategic plan and Godavari Declaration. In 2013, the priority areas of this activity will be to complete the constituency wise and election related thematic map production and production of the Electoral Atlas, establishment of GIS at DEOs level, central and regional trainings for ECN/DEOs staff, political parties and other electoral stakeholders, and the development of an online GIS system. The in-house GIS facilities aim at developing digital mapping of the country including all administrative and electoral boundaries with population and voting statistics. The development of GIS will be useful in planning and management of electoral processes and monitoring and observation of future elections.

Activity 1.4: Support with Creation and Display of New Voter Register

In 2013, ESP will continue its support to ECN on voter registration through technical assistance of national and regional level IT advisors. The voter registration process is heavily IT dependent and as a result is overseen in large part by ECN's IT unit, in collaboration with the VR unit. The project will continue to focus on building the existing IT and VR staff capacity to manage the continuous voter registration process, including ECN staff at the district and regional levels. The project will also continue to advocate for speedy recruitment of the new IT positions approved through ECN's organizational review. For building capacity, in addition the transfer of knowledge from the experts working alongside ECN, the project will also provide other opportunities for training and learning to voter registration and IT staff, and develop induction program for the new IT staff. These trainings will focus on management and maintenance of voter registration and other IT intensive activities of the Commission. With regards to supporting the ECN Data Center, the project plans to support ECN in the establishment of the Disaster Recovery Site and the backup facilities at both GIDC and within the ECN premises. Through this activity, the project also will complete the voter list assessment and support ECN in address any gaps identified through this process. The project also is supporting ECN in developing the software that allows true continuous voter registration; support for this includes the procurement of services of an international firm to develop the software. In order to meet the growing ECN demand in the area of IT and the upcoming software development activity, ESP has engaged the services of an international United Nations Volunteer (UNV) to strengthen the IT team.

Activity 2.1: Support with Procedures and Training

Output 2 is geared mostly towards election-event activities, as such they will commence in full once it is clear that an election is eminent. Activity 2.2 focuses on support to ECN in the areas of election procedures and training to polling officials. ESP plans to provide technical assistance to ECN in these areas to provide advice in the review and drafting of election guidelines and regulations, development of procedures and other areas as need arises over the course of the year. In addition to technical assistance and advice, the project also plans to support ECN in reaching out and raising awareness amongst stakeholders at a regional level on the new guidelines and procedures. Similarly,











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the project will support cascade training on the new procedures to election staff deployed for elections; these trainings are also envisioned at regional level. The project will also support trainings at regional level for NGOs, CSO, media, political parties and others on the new framework/guidelines/procedures. The activity also includes the printing of election materials to be distributed at these trainings.

Activity 2.2: Support with Operations and Logistics

In the 2013 AWP, the ESP has included support for ECN's operational and logistics preparations for elections in 2013. This support includes technical assistance for the further development of the draft operational plan prepared by the international advisor at the end of 2012. Following ECN's feedback on the draft plan and further discussions between the technical team of ESP and ECN's operational unit, the operational plan will be revised further and include scenarios and strategies for planning in an uncertain environment. Following the development of the operational plans, the finalization of election guidelines/procedures, this activity also plans supporting ECN's operational trainings on polling, counting, and results tabulation. Other trainings planned under this activity include regional level trainings on election operations and logistics management. Through this activity, the project expects to target district level officials who are key to the logistical operations of an election. Under this activity there is provision for support to regional offices during the election period. This support was included in the project document per request of the former Chief Commissioner and the recommendations of the 2010 UN Election Mission. This support envisions technical assistance of two experts at the regional level, based at ECN's current offices. Following recent leadership changes, this area of support is under further discussion with ECN and may change/evolve following completion of these discussions and with more clarity on the electoral and political environment. Activity 2.2 also includes limited media monitoring at the regional level during the campaign period, designed to support and complement ECN's own monitoring activities. Other support in this area includes establishing an election operational center; this is not for infrastructure but for establishing the unit within ECN through provision for the necessary equipment, furniture, software, etc. Finally, this activity also provisions support for the procurement of election materials. Given the uncertainly around the type of election, the details of this procurement support will be further developed with ECN and in coordination with what it expects to procure through the NPTF project. This procurement support is intended to fill a gap in the event that international procurement is required.

Activity 2.3: Support with Electoral Dispute Resolution

The support to Electoral Dispute Resolution is in the form of technical assistance to ECN through experts working closely with the legal team of the Commission. Through this technical assistance, the project will support ECN in taking forward recommendations from the different assessments including the 2012 review of the EDR chapter of the new draft Electoral Act; the drafting, review and amendment of legislation and development of regulations for the new Act, and identifying strategies to enhance institutional memory and fill EDR data gap identified by the recent electoral violence assessment mission. Through this technical assistance, the project will also transfer knowledge and information on effective claims and complaints procedures, assess and provide recommendations for improved processing of complaints and conduct trainings and workshop with judges, lawyers and other related professionals. This activity will be directly linked and coordinated with Activity 2.4 Support with Electoral Security and Activity 1.2 Professional Development under which BRIDGE training on EDR is planned for 2012.









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Activity 2.4: Support with Electoral Security

Following an independent high level electoral violence and mitigation assessment, ESP, in 2013, will prioritize the implementation of recommendations of the assessment team. The activities include development of a national anti-electoral violence strategy and campaign messaging to raise awareness on and prevent electoral violence. The project will provide technical assistance also to develop an electoral security plan and advice ECN on strategies to strengthen its information sharing mechanisms. The project will also support ECN in exploring and adopting electoral risk management tools available globally. The project also plans to support ECN in conducting a series of consultations, workshops and seminars on the subject matter in an effort to raise awareness, understanding and information on electoral violence and its prevention. The activity is linked and coordinated with the project's support to Electoral Dispute Resolution.

Activity 3.1: Support with Public Outreach, Civic and Voter Education

The UNDP/ ESP plans to support the Election commission of Nepal extensively in the areas of Public outreach, civic and Voter education. The ESP plans to provide technical assistance and financial support to prepare ECN'S strategy, policies and action plans for the upcoming elections. For this planning and strategy work ESP will conduct a nationwide survey to gauge the public's understating of the electoral process. ESP will provide technical assistance and support the production and publication of voter education materials including specific ones targeting women and vulnerable communities; the materials will be produced in various languages. ESP will provide assistance in preparing voter education manuals; and provide the opportunities for training and learning workshops for ECN officials at both national and local levels. The project will also support the designing and launching of the mobile outreach campaign including the procurement of equipment.

Activity 3.2: Support with Electoral Education and Information Center (EEIC)

The ESP support in 2013 will include continued technical assistance to the operational functioning of EEIC. This technical assistance will focus on building management capacity within EEIC, the finalization and monitoring of the business plan and marketing plan, and implementation of strategies for sustainability of the Center including public private partnerships. The project will also support educational and outreach activities including producing videos covering the thematic areas of the EEIC. The project will also strengthen the EEIC library through procurement of publications (books, journals, etc.). The project is also planning to conduct training to social studies teachers from schools across the country, in an effort to raise awareness on civic and voter education and the activities of ECN. The project will also complete the waiting area for the EEIC during 2013 and provide limited support to the maintenance and operations of the Center, per discussion and request of ECN.

Activity 3.3: Support with External Relation

Under this activity ESP will focus on enhancing ECN capacity to reach out to external partners, particular around the election-event. This support will include reviewing and developing codes of conduct, establishment of a media center that will facilitate more effective media handling; supporting ECN in developing materials for the media on the various phases of the electoral process; and development of a media strategy. The project will also support ECN in the establishment of an election observation coordination unit focused on supporting observers in obtaining accreditation, receiving training on the electoral process and obtaining information from the ECN. The project will also support ECN in coordinating with partners/NGOs/COS in the area of election observations and also support ECN in developing procedures and kits for the observers.

Activity 3.4: Gender, Social Inclusion and Vulnerable Groups

Activity 3.4 envisions increased democratic participation of citizens specially those of the underrepresented disadvantaged segments of Nepali Society. ESP will provide, through its Gender and

Social Inclusion expert, the overall onsite technical assistance in strengthening ECN's capacity to address gender and social inclusion issues. The project will continue to advocate for the adoption of the Gender/Social Inclusion Policy, the institutionalization of the gender unit within ECN, and reach out to the district and regional offices to raise their awareness on ECN's gender programming. The project will continue to conduct trainings at regional level with a wide range of stakeholders and support exposure visits for concerned focal persons to learn from the experience of other EMBs on the effective implementation of gender policy. The activities geared towards increasing women's and disadvantaged groups leadership/political participation will include workshops, seminars and consultation meetings with and within different political parties, civil societies and media on legislations, code of conducts, political party bills etc in gender /social inclusion issues. The project will also support the holding of a national level conference with participation from experts in the region and women political leaders/activists to share experiences, network, learn from one another and to strategize ways forward for ECN to enhance its own gender programming. The project will also focus on empowering women and members of disadvantaged groups as informed and enabled citizens taking part in elections. To achieve this, the civic and voter education programme and materials will be developed ensuring that it reaches out to the women and disadvantaged group as well as ensuring that the materials are gender/social inclusion sensitive. Similarly, the present structures at the community level (community groups, ward citizen forums, citizen awareness centers) will be utilized to disseminate information and education materials in liaison with appropriate partners. National and regional based NGOs, Civil society groups (Dalit or janajati federations) Development Partners and Government structures will be involved in the process through workshops and capacity building exercises

Activity 4.1: Monitoring & Evaluation

As outlined in 2013 AWP, the ESP will carry out regular monitoring and evaluation based on the Phase II M&E framework currently being finalized. As a part of the M&E support, ESP will also provide technical assistance to ECN in the area of M&E both in general training on monitoring and evaluation mechanisms and also to support ECN in its review of progress against its Strategic Plan. As part of ensuring a strong and effect M&E framework, the project will undertake a nationally representative baseline survey to fill gaps in baseline information. The project has recently recruited a Monitoring & Evaluation Officer, responsible to develop and implement an effective M&E mechanism for the project. The M&E Officer will also support the project in enhancing its results reporting, focusing on monitoring progress against outcome level indicators.

7. CONCLUSION

Despite some of the challenges encountered by the project during the process of implementation, the planned activities were carried out smoothly during the reporting period. The support and cooperation received from the Election Commission of Nepal and development partners have contributed to the effective implementation of the project.

The UNDP-ESP will continue providing technical and operation support to the ECN on Voter Registration, Revision and implementation of Strategic Plan of ECN, EEIC, GIS, Gender and Inclusion and BRIDGE in 2013. Emphasis will also be on strengthening procurement and financial capacities of ECN for sustainability. The project will also work closely with ECN in developing electoral violence mitigation strategy. Therefore, for the successful continuation of the support extended to ECN, the project looks forward to receiving continual support and cooperation from all the implementing partners.

Election Commission, Nepal

Outcomes of the Annual Review and Planning Workshop, 2012

(Godavari Outcomes)

Preamble:

Being committed to the objective of the Election Commission of Nepal to manage elections in a free, fair and credible manner;

Being oriented towards enhancing the participation of voters and other stakeholders in the election related activities by developing the Election Commission of Nepal as an institution based on state-of-art technologies;

Being prepared to formulating and implementing the next Strategic Plan by reviewing the existing Strategic Plan, 2009 of the Election Commission of Nepal, prepared and being implemented for a period of five years;

By taking into consideration the reports and recommendations of the regional level annual review workshops held at seven different locations of the country with the objective of reviewing the implementation status of programs and activities carried out during the Fiscal Year 2011/12;

Being cognitive to the regional, divisional, sectional and thematic presentations made during the Annual Review and Planning Workshop, 2012 of the Election Commission of Nepal;

NOW, THEREFORE, following resolutions, in the form of the 'Godavari Outcomes', have been unanimously adopted by the participating officials working within and under the Secretariat of the Election Commission of Nepal at the end of the Annual Review and Planning Workshop of the Election Commission of Nepal, 2012 with the pledge of being actively involved in envisioning the future course of action of the Election Commission of Nepal:

1) Necessary policies, laws, methodologies, procedures and implementation processes relating to the electoral system, electoral roll, electoral/voter education, training, gender and social inclusion, expansion of physical infrastructure, relationship with stakeholders, integrated laws relating to election management and political parties, application of modern technologies in elections, election related research and study, monitoring and evaluation, observation, etc. will gradually be implemented by formulating a new Strategic Plan for the Election Commission of Nepal.

- 2) An integrated program covering the activities relating to voter registration, electoral education and mock poling through the application of electoral voting machine and training related thereto will be implemented in each district.
- 3) The ongoing Voter Registration with Photograph Program will be implemented as a continuous activity and the special campaign by making it more easy and simplified; and the 'Voter Registration Week' will be observed within this year at an appropriate time by internalizing the very essence of the *mantra* -'Let no one be left; Let all voters be registered'.
- 4) Participatory capacity of the center as well as district level will be enhanced by internalizing the notion of decentralization while carrying out activities relating to planning, program formulation and public procurement.
- 5) A 'Performance Management System' will be introduced in the Election Commission of Nepal and District Election Offices thereunder.
- 6) A system of reward and punishment based on the performance standard of the employee will be developed. While providing incentive opportunities, the state of clearance and minimization of arrears will also be taken into account.
- 7) All the budgets will be sent from the center to the district level offices through authorization (akhtiyari) process.
- 8) Efforts will be made to acquire lands required for District Election Offices upon their own initiation and in coordination of the Election Commission of Nepal; and the construction of the office building will be brought forward upon the availability of resources.
- 9) The provision of not using the office equipments, resources and materials and other logistics for other than the official purposes without prior approval of the Election Commission of Nepal will be strictly abided by. Likewise, appropriate attention will be given for the rational use and repair and maintenance of such equipments and resources and materials.
- 10) Electoral Education Program will be made within the reach of common people through various means with the collaboration of, and in coordination with, the stakeholders.
- 11) Outreach programs targeted for backward and marginalized classes, regions, sexes and special communities will be implemented with priority.
- 12) Every employee working within or under the Election Commission of Nepal will be provided an opportunity to participate in at least one training or capacity development program in a year by identifying his/her needs.
- 13) In order to maintain the level of morale and motivation of the employees working within or under the Election Commission of Nepal at the higher level, plans and programs will be prepared and implemented accordingly.

14) An electoral profile containing the map of each polling station will be prepared by integrating and analyzing the data and statistics related to Polling Center Master List (PCML) and

Geographic Information System (GIS).

15) Necessary liaison, coordination and collaboration with the Government of Nepal, development partners and other stakeholders will be maintained so as to make arrangements of resources and materials required for the implementation of these 'Godavari Outcomes'. The principles of austerity and effectiveness will be kept at the center while managing the available resources

and materials.

16) An annual work plan, based on the multi-year budget and programs of the Commission and District Election Offices, will be prepared and implemented by ensuring inter-sectional as well as

district and central level coordination.

17) While carrying out these 'Godavari Outcomes', more emphasis will be given on observance of

the guiding principles adopted by the Election Commission of Nepal; such as, participatory

approach, impartiality, accountability and responsibility, service orientation, professional

integrity, transparency, credibility, gender and social inclusion, proactiveness and innovation

and independence.

18) Monitoring and evaluation will be made continuous, objective and systematic. Likewise,

recommendations made by the monitoring will be implemented.

19) These 'Godavari Outcomes', to be adopted by this Annual Review and Planning Workshop, will

ipso facto be transformed into the 'Godavari Declaration, 2012' upon the approval by the

Election Commission of Nepal.
